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VERA CRUZ SEWER PROJECT UPDATE

T he proposed Vera Cruz Sewer Project design is moving forward pursuing a low-pressure type system. Spotts, Stevens, McCoy Engineers and consultants for this project have completed the general design plans and submitted the necessary permit applications to the various outside agencies for ultimate approval and permit issuances.

During the next few weeks, certain property owners will be contacted for the purpose of obtaining easements or rights-of-way on or across their properties for the future construction of the facilities.

The Township, through the services of an independent consultant, may perform an updated income survey. This income survey is critical in determining if, and to what degree, outside financial assistance will be available. The Township asks that residents who are involved cooperate fully if contacted for information regarding the income survey.

Based on the lengthy Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection permit review and issuance process, it appears that the earliest the project could break ground, if authorized, would be in spring of 2010. Copies of the design plans are available for review at the Township Building.

We anticipate that additional public meetings will be scheduled to update everyone on the progress of this project. Individual households will be notified of the future meetings.

PERMITS REQUIRED

Upper Milford Township is a zoned community. The following are required:

BONFIRE PERMIT: required at least 10 days in advance of the proposed bonfire.

BUILDING AND/OR ZONING PERMIT: required for new construction, additions or alterations to PERMITS exterior of existing structures; deck, patio, pool, spa or hot tub; electrical work or wiring; plumbing and HVAC work;

DRIVEWAY PERMIT: required for the construction of a driveway or other means of ingress or egress onto a Township or a (HOP) Highway Occupancy Permit for a PennDOT road.

sheds and accessory structures.

FENCE OR WALL PERMIT: required for the installation of any fence or wall over two feet high.

GRADING PERMIT: required if not in conjunction with another permit.

MOVING PERMIT: required when moving into, out of or within Upper Milford Township. There is no fee for this permit.

OCCUPANCY PERMIT: required prior to occupying a newly constructed building.

PARK PERMIT: required in order to reserve a pavilion in a township park.

> **PEDDLER'S PERMIT:** must be obtained before engaging in solicitation or peddling in Upper Milford Township.

SEWAGE PERMIT: required for the inspection of a new septic system and for the repair or enlargement of an existing system.

TREE CUTTING AND LOGGING

PERMIT: required if more than 10 trees/year or more than 30 percent of total number of trees on lot. Call the Township office for specific information.

USE OR CHANGE OF USE: required for any activity, occupation, business, or operation carried on or intended to be carried on in a structure or lot.

Other permits may be required for certain activities. For specific information call **610-966-3223**.

PLANNING ON DIGGING?

all Pennsylvania One Call System, Inc. (POCS) three business days before you dig at 800-242-1776 or 8-1-1. PA Act 287 as amended requires excavators as well as private landowners to call POCS three days prior to any type of digging with power equipment.

Mark your excavation area in white paint before calling with a dig notification.

By calling you allow the facility owners the opportunity to locate and mark their underground facility in advance of the planned excavation (gas and liquid pipelines will mark underground facilities using yellow stakes, flags or paint).

TIME FOR A CHANGE?

The financial savings of hiring one trash/recyclable hauler to serve all of Upper Milford Township may not be huge. But have township residents ever considered the environmental advantages?


Upper Milford residents currently are served by six private haulers who charge them about \$300 to \$400 a year. All Emmaus residents are served by one company (Waste Management) under contract with the borough. They pay \$296 a year. Alburtis residents also have one (J.P. Mascaro) and pay more: \$336 a year. But Lower Macungie Township residents have one (Waste Management) and pay only \$288 a year. South Whitehall Township residents have one (Mascaro) and pay only \$263.

What you probably don't know is that some Upper Milford residents have no trash service. Some neighbors put all their trash out together and apparently share the cost of having it picked up by one hauler who may not limit how much can be set out.

But others are just burning the same wastes, including plastics, which most of us set out at the edge of the road for pick up every week. More than just annoying smoke, that burning produces airborne toxins in violation of state environmental law. Centralized collection of trash and recyclables also should reduce the potential for illegal dumping. Ordinance No. 97 regulates open burning. This is available on our website.

Several other environmental and quality of life factors should be considered.

- How many mornings a week do trash trucks create an obstacle course on your street when you're hurrying to get to work?
- When you sleep with your windows open, how many mornings do you unintentionally wake up before the roosters because of the noise those trucks make?
- How much less noise and truck traffic would there be if just one hauler came through your neighborhood once a week?



 In addition to being more efficient, proponents of having a single hauler under contract with the Township argue the move would improve the quality of service.

There is another side to all this of course, one that should not be overlooked. Going with one company for the entire Township could seriously hurt business for other trash haulers now serving Upper Milford.

Proponents of keeping trash collection as it is in Upper Milford also fear that, while the initial cost may be lower if the Township establishes a contract with just one hauler, eventually those costs will rise. They want the freedom to hire the hauler of their choice, are happy with the price and service of the hauler they have now and are convinced competition will keep prices lower.

They may suggest trash truck traffic could be controlled by requiring all companies to collect trash on the same day. And they may insist the argument about trash trucks adding to wear and tear on Township roads is phony because those roads should be built and maintained in accordance with construction standards.

TURN YOUR TRASH INTO GARDEN SOIL WITH A COMPOSTER



By composting, you can keep material out of your trash and turn it into rich healthy soil for your garden. Compost loosens up the soil for better root growth and helps retain moisture for healthier plants. All you need is water, oxygen and food.



Almost any organic material can be food for the composter. Some of the things you can feed your composter are leaves, grass clippings, and wood chips from the yard; coffee grounds, vegetable peelings, eggshells, tea bags and paper towels from the kitchen; and shredded cardboard, shredded newspaper and wood ashes from the living room. Even pet

hair and dryer lint can go in. About the only things that should not go into the pile are meat, fish, oil or fat, and pet or human waste.

You can make your own bin with four posts and some chicken wire, the easiest way to get started is purchasing

or making your own.



Select a spot for your compost bin under a deciduous tree so it doesn't overheat in summer and gets enough sun to keep warm in winter. It should be in direct contact with the ground so that the natural bacteria in the soil can reach your compost.

WIRELESS INTERNET service has come to the Emmaus Public Library! Bring your laptop, ask for the password, and surf the 'net and read your e-mail.

As part of the **2009 ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION** of the Borough of Emmaus, the library is hosting a continuous **slide show** each month on a specific topic relevant to the history of Emmaus. The slide show will be coordinated with a display of artifacts from the archives of the Emmaus Historical Society. Come by each month to see this changing display.

The library will once again run its ever-popular series of **Internet-related** workshops in late spring: How to Search the Internet; How to Find a Book; the Basics of the POWERLibrary Collection of Databases; and Intro to Genealogy. Watch for dates and times to be announced. **Mice and Icons**, the individual introduction to a computer, is available by calling the library to schedule your appointment.

The **summer reading activities** at the library will be exciting as the theme is "**Be Creative @ Your Library**". There will be activities for everyone. Watch especially for Thursday evening Family Nights throughout the summer.

The library has many services and items for all ages. The collection of **large print books** grows monthly, as does the number of titles in the audio book collections. Downloadable audio books are fast becoming an easy way to listen to your favorite titles on-the-go. The interface has been made easier and now some iPod-compatible titles are online through netLibrary.

At the library you can browse through any of the **more than 90 magazines** now housed in the magazine kiosk. The previous month's issues may be borrowed for one week.

The **public access computers** are available for all residents. Bring your library card or sign up for one so you can log onto a computer. Internet access, helpful websites, word processing, and the library catalog are all part of the computers. E-mail, job applications online, and your favorite websites are all here. If you need assistance, any of the librarians on staff will be glad to help you. Your library card, along with a PIN, will allow you to reserve books online, renew items online, and check your account. Just remember, **the librarians are ready to help** show you how to navigate the catalog. You can set up "current awareness profiles" in your library account so that you will receive an e-mail notification when a new item with your selected criteria is added to the library's collection.

Fundraising for the addition to the library continues. All contributions are most welcome. It is hoped that groundbreaking will take place in early 2010.

HIVEL UND DAHL PRESERVATION SOCIETY

T he Hivel und Dahl Preservation Society has been in existence in Upper Milford Township since 1992. Meetings are held on the fourth Tuesday of each month in the Upper Milford Township Building.



The current goal of the organization is to successfully restore the Schubert/Graber Log Cabin in Powder Valley. This

is generally considered to be the oldest existing structure in the Township that at one time was a home. Built by a Schwenkfelder cooper named Melchoir Schubert around 1760, this stone and log bank building has corner posts with mortise and tenon joinery.

It is hoped that upon restoration, the site will serve as a repository for Pennsylvania German artifacts and memorabilia, and can also be made available for cultural activities, school class tours, and architectural studies.

Schubert-Graber Log Cabin Powder Valley. PA - Circa 1760 Under the leadership of Schubert descendants Bruce Mordaunt and Jack Engle, the Hivel und Dahl is regenerating and work on the cabin is again being ordered and continued, in many cases from the personal means of

members. Now, plans have been made to attract more members, regain lost ones, and to raise funds.

In February, the necessary paperwork was completed in applying for a \$5,000 grant, which will hopefully be given out this summer. The Hivel und Dahl strives to continue its work of preservation, especially of this historic structure.

The organization held its annual meeting this year on March 31* at the Township building. Featured guests were Barbara Miller Heist and Beulah Batman Miller, authors of the 1976 book "The History of Powder Valley" and lifelong natives to this area.

The book begins with a page featuring the Schubert/Graber cabin and is a comprehensive collection of information and photographs of Powder Valley. Watch for future meetings with similar topics of local significance.

Zionsville, Old Zionsville, Emmaus, Macungie – all of these are addresses within Upper Milford Township. Add to these the names of Vera Cruz, and Powder Valley and you begin to appreciate the far-flung, rural character that is the Township. This article touches on the early history of one of those rustic areas, Powder Valley.

In the 1844 Matthews and Hungerford "History of Lehigh County" on page 104 it is noted that Powder Valley is located on the Indian Creek on the public road leading from the Shimersville and Herford Turnpike to the Hosensack Valley. Originally, it was known as Piercetown, later as Powder Mill Valley, and then shortened to Powder Valley. At various times in history, it has been part of Bucks County or Northampton County. Powder Valley had six dwellings, one store, one pottery and one saw and grist mill at the time.

A powder mill was erected by Henry Kemmerer in 1829 and functioned for about a year before it was sold to Henry Trump and Henry Schell, who carried it on for about another year. But it exploded and was discontinued! In 1831, the same Henry Kemmerer



built another powder mill, which functioned for a few years while suffering several explosions; three lives were lost. Evidence of the existence of these powder mills may be found in some charcoal pits scattered in the area, since charcoal was a component in



the manufacture of gunpowder, and in foundation remnants of these early mills. There really was lots of powder in Powder Valley's past!

When Christopher Schubert bought the powder mill, he replaced it with a wool-carding mill, which was later sold to the Indian Creek Mining Company, which sold it in 1852 to Solomon Moyer, who in turn sold it in 1869 to Stahl & Company. This company brings the Stahl name to Powder Valley, which is so prominent in Powder Valley today. The Stahl Company discontinued the woolen mills and factory

and built a stave mill. This mill, too, was sold in 1871 to Nathan Stahl, who erected a new sawmill with a steam engine in 1874. In December 1882 this mill was totally destroyed by fire. Mr. Stahl built a new grist and saw mill in 1883.

In 1883, Charles Stahl built a pottery that operated until about 1901. In 1932, his sons, Thomas and Isaac, began a pottery that has evolved into the Stahl's Pottery of our times with the festival and other events that have put Powder Valley on the map! Thomas died in 1942 and Isaac continued the pottery until about 1946. He died four years later, but Stahl Pottery lives on, and their pieces are widely collected and treasured. Explore this special part of Powder Valley history on the Internet, where you will also find a history and much more about Stahl's Pottery and its Preservation Society. Also, Anne and Barbara Goda have authored a beautiful, comprehensive book on the subject, "Stahl's Pottery: a Window to the Past."

This is only a smidgeon of Powder Valley history. We haven't mentioned: the ice houses; the oldest home still standing (known as the Schubert/Graber Cabin); the center of the village life at the general store; the popular summer vacation resort called Indian Creek Cottage; the distilleries; Schubert's School; colorful resident Chief Knippapoo; when the dam broke in 1935; the Powder Valley baseball team formed in 1921 and playing on fields that are now our backyards; the Powder Valley Band; Salem United Methodist Church with its horse shed still intact; Grace Evangelical Congregational Church in the southern end of the valley. Each has a history of its own to be told.

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Information About

RADON

Radon is a cancer-causing, radioactive gas that you can't see, smell or taste. But it may be causing a problem in your home.

R adon is estimated to cause many thousands of deaths each year. That's because when you breathe air containing radon, you can get lung cancer. In fact, the Surgeon General has warned that radon is the second-leading cause of lung cancer in the United States today. Only smoking causes more lung cancer deaths. If you smoke and your home has high radon levels, your risk of lung cancer is especially high.

HOW DOES RADON GET INTO YOUR HOME?

Radon is a radioactive gas that comes from the natural decay of uranium found in nearly all soils. It typically moves up through the ground to the air above and into your home through cracks and other holes in the foundation.

Radon gets into your home through:

- Cracks in floors.
- Construction joints.
- Cracks in walls.
- Gaps in suspended floors.
- Gaps around service pipes.
- Cavities inside walls.
- The water supply.

RADON IN WATER

The radon in your home's indoor air can come from two sources: the soil or your water supply. Compared to radon entering the home through water, radon entering your home through the soil is usually a much larger risk.

The radon in your water supply poses an inhalation risk and an ingestion risk. Research has shown that your risk of lung cancer from breathing radon in air is much larger than your risk of stomach cancer from swallowing water with radon in it. (Most of your risk from radon in water comes from radon released into the air when water is used for showering and other household purposes.)

We are very grateful that the UMHS was remembered when the Zionsville Post Office was closed because the chalkboard from the building was taken down and donated to our small collection. We all eagerly await the day the society can move into a space at Kings Highway where the records, photos and memorabilia already collected can be put on proper display for all Township residents to see and enjoy.

The society meets on the last Thursday of each month (except December) at 7 p.m. in the Township meeting room. Please come and "check us out" for an evening as we reminisce and gather history about our Township. The more residents who join in our discussions, the more information we can compile, and the more complete our record of Upper Milford Township will be.

Take care of yourself. EXERCISE.

We constantly hear and read about this everywhere these days to promote a healthy lifestyle, and rightfully so. Here's a suggestion that may help all of us heed that good, sound advice, and it involves Upper Milford Township: Get out to one of the Township's three great parks, where there is plenty of space for exercising, being outside, walking and "using it so we don't lose it."

At Lenape Park in Old Zionsville, for example, you can play a game or two of tennis, or just hit balls off the practice boards. You can shoot a few hoops

on the basketball court, or take some friends and play a game. If the courts are busy, grab a bat and some balls and take a few swings. Someone has to chase those hits, right? Now that's exercise!

If basketball or baseball aren't your things, how about going to the volleyball courts with a friend or two and getting your body to stretch and lunge after some slams and dunks. Maybe you can play kickball on one of the open, grassy areas, or walk your dog around the park – just don't forget to pick up after Rover! (Don't forget to put a leash on Rover too!). Or you might just take a stroll by yourself, taking time to notice the vegetation and the care that's given to keep everything in great shape.



What a variety of healthy, pleasurable activities you can choose at Lenape Park. When you stop at **Churchview Park on Kohler Road**, you come upon one huge, paved, oval track (also a small one) that's begging you to lace up your sneakers and walk or run, pedal your bike around the track, or even roll along on a pair of skates. No muddy shoes,



nobody in your way, no excuses! What a wide open, clean, peaceful place to drink in nature while improving your health – not just physically, but mentally, too!

Traveling to **Jasper Park in Vera Cruz**, there is a trail just for walking, jogging, or running through the woods. Notice the jasper pits, the trees, and the flower garden along the way. It helps pass the time on the trail. We are happy so many people have discovered the use of this fitness trail. There's also a place with exercise bars and a platform where you can stretch and push and pull those muscles as you wish. If teams from the Upper Milford Youth Association aren't using the baseball

or soccer fields at the time doing the kid version of exercising (also known as playing), you can run and kick or hit balls for hours. Playing on the playground equipment would get your body moving, too. Jasper Park is also a favorite place for walking Rover at the same time his owner is exercising. Again, remember the clean-up and leash detail!

Of course, when you're visiting any of our Township parks it is important to follow the rules. Here are a few:

- Park only in designated areas.
- No littering. Everybody knows that! The parks have lots of trash receptacles for your convenience.


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
